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**A NEW RESEARCH TOOL:  
MATHEMATICAL MODELLING IN THE  
MEASUREMENT OF VOCABULARY  
DIVERSITY.**

Most measures of lexical diversity or repetitiveness have the disadvantage of being dependent on the size of the language sample used for measurement. For the Type-Token Ratio, for example, the more tokens that are included from a transcript or text the lower the ratio will be. This phenomenon has distorted research findings in a number of areas of linguistic research (Richards & Malvern, 1997).

A solution to the problem is to model the curvilinear relationship between TTR values and the number of tokens. Mathematically modelling the probability of new vocabulary being introduced into longer and longer texts offers a method for measuring lexical diversity that is not dependent on the size of the sample of words in the way that TTR and other measures are. An equation and a set of procedures for curve fitting are used to produce a single parameter, *D*, which provides the best fit for the TTR versus Token curve for any language sample. The advantages of this approach are that the measure is not a function of sample size, all the data available in a transcript are made use of, and the values for *D* represent the TTR versus Token curve rather than a single point on it.

The project has developed software which will act on any transcript in the CHAT format of the CHILDES Project (MacWhinney, 1995). In fact, the text-handling part of the program has been modeled on *FREQ* in Brian MacWhinney's *CLAN* software, and unless other options are chosen will divide up any transcript into types and tokens in the same way as *FREQ*. The difference from *FREQ* is that it outputs a sequential list of words from the target speaker on which the mathematical algorithms then operate.

The software calculates and averages TTRs for given token sizes and produces a series of such averages for subsamples of increasing token size. Curve fitting procedures then output the value for *D* that represents the best fit between the actual and theoretical TTR versus Token curve.

At the moment, the software exists in a prototype UNIX version. After further testing and validation work, and the implementation of additional options, we hope to offer a final version to Brian MacWhinney for inclusion in *CLAN*. Preliminary validation of *D* as a measure has produced encouraging results (Malvern & Richards, 1997).
